Sydney cruise terminal delayed again

NO FURTHER work is being done on a proposed new Sydney cruise terminal in Botany Bay due to the COVID-19 crisis, with NSW Transport and Ports Minister, Andrew Constance, confirming the project has been "put on hold with all industry and community engagement suspended".

Constance said the project was no longer a priority for the government or the cruise sector, with any plans delayed for up to 18 months.

Significant uncertainty about post-coronavirus demand for cruising has contributed to the change of heart, while Royal Caribbean Cruises, which previously indicated its willingness to help fund a terminal, has also been heavily hit financially, according to a Nine Publishing report.

A detailed business case for a possible cruise terminal between



Yarra Bay and Molineaux Point had been under development by the NSW Ports Authority for some months (CW 18 Sep 2019), with the project strenuously opposed by local activists and the NSW Labor opposition.

The "Save the Bay Coalition" is claiming credit for the move, saying it had written to officials urging them to cancel the project.

The anti-cruise group has also

pledged to "investigate the cosy relationship between the cruise industry and Federal/ NSW politicians and decision makers" as well as undertaking a social media campaign to share information about the unfolding Ruby Princess investigation.

The option of a cruise terminal at Garden Island shared with the Navy, has repeatedly been ruled out by the Federal Government.

Europe bracing

EUROPE is bracing for cruise ship arrivals, with the **European Commission last** week issuing additional advice on how national governments can set up ports to process up to 8,000 cruise ship passengers due to disembark in the continent this week.

The advice also instructs on meeting quarantine criteria.

Eight crew on Black Watch with COVID-19

COVID-19 has been confirmed in eight crew of Fred. Olsen Cruises' Black Watch, with six more tests still to return results.

The ship, moored in the Firth of Forth in Scotland, has no guests on board, and is operating under the current guidance from Public Health England, a spokesperson for the cruise line added.

"Each crew member is occupying their own cabin, each with a balcony," they said.

"There are no social gatherings on board...crew are only leaving their cabins to perform essential duties, which includes bridge watch, engine watch and the preparation of food.

"Those who have received a positive diagnosis or who are feeling unwell are not undertaking any duties."



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
