Small ship spike

CRUISE Traveller Managing Director Craig Bowen has said the cruising pause is a chance for the small ship market to redefine itself, with the Gold-Coast-based wholesaler seeing a 32% spike in bookings for small ship expeditions in 2021.

With boutique and expedition cruise operators likely to be the first in the industry to restart cruises, Bowen said surging demand shows interest from travellers in the sector's value proposition of "ecosustainable innovation", with Bowen closely aligning small expedition ships the with adventure travel sector.

Europe plots cruise restart

AUTHORITIES in the European Union (EU) have issued formal guidance for restarting cruise ship operations "after lifting restrictive measures in response to the COVID-19 pandemic".

The European Union Healthy Gateways document notes public health risks for coronavirus transmission are a "new reality globally," saying strategies should cover the entire process right from booking through until passengers and crew have returned to their homes.

A gradual approach is suggested, including initial short itineraries with limited port visits.

Designated destinations must have the capacities to provide appropriate public health emergency response, with operators asked to submit a contingency plan for each call. The ability to test for COVID-19 on board or ashore, a commitment to immediate reporting of any cases and comprehensive crew training are prerequisites, and ships must be able to individually isolate 5% of passengers and crew on board when it is not possible to disembark anyone infected within 24 hours.

However if 24-hour disembarkation is possible, isolation for just 1% of those on board is required.

EU Healthy Gateways will support health authorities in each country to perform "focused inspections on board each cruise ship and ashore," while other precautions should include physical distancing, alcohol-based hand sanitisers throughout, and limiting kids clubs to outdoor areas only where possible.

Virgin Voyages lifts travel agent pay

VIRGIN Voyages is increasing its commission for travel agencies to 16%, as well as offering 10% commission on pre-cruise sales of add-ons such as shore excursions, spa treatments and drinks.

Chief Executive Tom McAlpin said the fledgling cruise line's "First Mates" (travel agent partners) are "a true extension of our team...we recognise how important their role is".

Carnival UK cuts

CARNIVAL UK has confirmed almost a third of its shore based staff have left the business this week, as part of "tough decisions to ensure that we can sustain and protect our business for the future," according to regional chief Simon Palethorpe.

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The Saga begins

UK CRUISE line Saga Cruises has revealed its inaugural cruise for *Spirit of Adventure* will sail on 05 Nov.

The ship, which is the second polar expedition newbuild in the fleet following *Spirit* of Discovery, will depart Southampton to sail the Mediterranean.

Saga was earlier forced to suspend a special trade preview of *Spirit of Adventure* due to the COVID-19 pandemic, with Head of Trade Sales Iain Powell saying it was "unclear" if the cruise line would be able to reschedule the event.

MEANWHILE, Saga CEO Robin Shaw is set to leave his role, the company said.

Shaw joined Saga in Mar 2010 as CEO of the company's cruise division, and was appointed to his current post in Jan 2018.



Hungary for Whales

BUDAPEST'S Balna shopping mall (**pictured**), known as "the Whale", is set to be turned into a cruise ship passenger terminal for Danube River cruises.

The plan was announced by Hungarian Tourism Agency head Zoltan Guller, and has reportedly received bipartisanship support from local government. The reworked Balna would also include a permanent exhibition and conference room, gastronomic "experience stands" and an information point.

Last year, Budapest welcomed around half a million river cruise ship passengers, according to the Hungarian Tourism Agency's calculations.

South Sea extends

SOUTH Sea Cruises' sale has been extended, on a range of the cruise line's product.

The operator launched the sale at the start of Jun, offering a range of buy-now-travel-later deals, with the promotion now extended to the end of the month due to its popularity.

Currently on offer is a Malamala Beach Club special, which offers a full- or half-day pass for FJD\$99 per person, as well as a F\$40 food and beverage voucher.

A South Sea Island special is also available, offering travellers a full-day family cruise, including a buffet barbecue lunch and drinks. Adults lead in at F\$99pp for a no-drinks package, and children F\$49pp, with infants aged 0-4 travelling free. Use SSI0FB to redeem.



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TECHNOLOGY group Wartsila and yacht designer Pastrovich Studio are set to develop a hybrid boutique cruise ship.

Aiming for the "luxury of a superyacht, the construction techniques and a passenger experience of a cruise ship, and a close focus on the environment", the vessels will be cost-optimised, and will serve the charter and luxury hotel sectors.

The design will feature a fully-integrated combination of hybrid propulsion and solar panels for minimal environmental impact and high levels of energy efficiency.

The concept is built around a 6o-metre long catamaran with accommodation for up to 36 passengers, and will be able to visit harbours that would otherwise be closed to large motor yachts.

Ponant lectures

PONANT has announced a Kimberley Facebook webinar program, which will include a range of lectures occurring across the month of Jul.

Where to next in New Zealand?

DESPITE our efforts to have the cruise suspension lifted on 30 Jun 2020 it has been extended, this time indefinitely.

The relevant legislation is the COVID-19 Public Health Response (Maritime Border) Order 2020 which says quite baldly that "Foreign ships are not permitted to arrive in New Zealand."

There are exemptions for cargo ships and fishing vessels, but not cruise. On the one hand not having an end date or re-start date could be a good thing as cruise could begin earlier.

The reality is that until our government decides it is safe to do so cruise will continue to be locked out, despite NZCA promoting cruise ships with New Zealand passengers only.

So where does that leave us? We have to continue to liaise with government letting them know that cruise is safe and a very good way to get New Zealand tourists to our own regions in an enjoyable safe manner.

We can get the passengers, we can get the ships, it just takes a willingness to drag us back to being a country that can make things happen.

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
