Hurtigruten to phase in its return

HURTIGRUTEN has extended its suspension of operations until 15 Jun, after which it is planning a gradual phase-in.

The cruise line is proposing to first resume operations in Norway, where it is headquartered, with other resumptions to occur as global restrictions are lifted.

"Gradually restarting operations within Norwegian waters is the natural first steps towards normalisation for us," said Chief Executive Officer Daniel Skjeldam.

"The size and scale of our stepby-step restart is dependent on national and international travel restrictions, government support and other external factors outside of our control."

Skjeldam said while there was a lot of uncertainty regarding what the next few weeks and months would bring, he was confident international restrictions would gradually be lifted, with Arctic



expedition cruises to be restarted in the northern summer.

Although Hurtigruten did not have any confirmed or suspected cases of COVID-19 on any of its ships, the company will be introducing new, strict health procedures, to be imposed before the restart of operations.

"We will implement hundreds of small and larger measures to

keep our guests and crew safe and healthy," Skjeldam said.

"Some of them are transitory, some will be permanent, but from even stricter hygiene protocols to reduced guest capacity to allow social distancing, this will give you a safer voyage".

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
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WHILE we may not be able to sail the oceans at present, we can certainly splendour in their beauty, which was on show in California last week.

The beaches had been closed for about two months.




RCI hunger strike

Project Hygiea

SHIP design company Foreship has launched Project Hygiea, which aims to keep COVID-19 off ships.

The approach comprises of four steps: interception, prevention, mitigation and evacuation.

Stage one sees Hygiea keep the biohazard off the ship, with ports to use technology for testing and measuring body temperature, with passengers screened for any potential vaccinations before being allowed to board the vessel.

Stage two is about preventing the virus from spreading, employing stringent hygiene measures and optimising spaces and routes to maintain a safe distance between individuals; technology will be contactless and automated to reduce transmission, and crew will be trained in sanitation and social distancing practices.

Stage three relates to isolating the pathogen through quarantining and decontamination to mitigate its impact, with technology such as air treatment systems and medical facilities to support these efforts.

Stage four focuses on preparation for the worst-case scenario, with evacuation procedures to be put in place, including routes through the ship designed for speedy extraction, and emergency suits, capsules and craft being made available.

Several companies are looking to initiate Project Hygiea protocols in the coming weeks, the company said.



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
