Brisbane Terminal on hold

THE closure of the Queensland border and the three-month extension of the Australian Government's cruise ban (CW 04 Sep) has put paid to any hopes that the new Brisbane International Cruise Terminal will open on schedule.

The \$177 million facility, which has been jointly funded in partnership with Carnival Australia, was timed to open on 03 Oct, just a month before the upcoming Qld state election.

However News Corp reports now speculate that it may not open until "at least Mar or Apr, possibly later" if the foreign cruise ship ban is extended again.

An update from the Port of Brisbane last week highlighted the recent delivery of two Passenger Boarding Bridges (CW 15 Jun), adding "we're committed to ensuring the Brisbane International Cruise Terminal is ready for when the authorities, in consultation with the cruise industry, determine that cruising can safely resume in Queensland".

A website tracking the

Terminal's construction noted originally 180 cruise ships had been scheduled to call during the facility's first season over the upcoming summer, with it "designed to cater for the biggest cruise ships in the world and give passengers a world-class experience".

The News report cites Cruise **Lines International Association** Australasia MD Joel Katz, who noted delays caused by the extensive preparations involved in restarting cruises, including bookings and sourcing F&B.

"These are long lead times and even if we were signing off on a restart today, it wouldn't be until the end of the year, Nov or Dec, that those ships would be able to get back to Australia," he said.

The first departure had been scheduled as P&O's Pacific Dawn which was due to sail on 03 Oct.

With the current biosecurity order ban in place until 17 Dec, the first voyage from the new facility could now be a Carnival Spirit seven-day Pacific Islands cruise scheduled for 20 Dec.

HURTIGRUTEN has opened bookings for 2022 departures visiting Alaska, Greenland, Iceland and the Northwest Passage.

The cruises in the 2022 northern hemisphere summer "take guests to some of the High North's most beautiful destinations sailing on our premium, spacious, small, sustainable ships that visit hard to reach places and small communities other ships can't access," said Damian Perry, Hurtigruten MD Asia-Pacific.

Two Northwest Passage voyages will operate, one aboard Hurtigruten's Roald Amundsen expedition flagship, cruising from Vancouver to Halifax, and a shorter version on Fram which starts at Cambridge Bay, after a flight from Edmonton, in Sep 2022.

The season also includes an exploration of Greenland's western coast aboard Fritjof Nansen roundtrip from Reykjavik - for more info see hurtigruten.com.au.


Dream Cruises restart a big success

DREAM Cruises' restart of cruise operations in Taiwan (CW 28 Jul) has been hailed as an overwhelming success, with occupancy levels now building to almost 100%.

The cruise line restarted operations in Jul aboard Explorer Dream, with the first sailing limited to just 50% occupancy as Dream implemented a range of COVID-19 safety policies.

Explorer Dream has been operating two-, three-, and four-night Taiwan Island-Hopping cruises from Keelung, visiting Kinmen, Penghu and Matsu Islands, with domestic passengers

"The market response to the Explorer Dream deployment in Taiwan is very encouraging," said Dream Cruises' parent company Genting Hong Kong.
