Silversea Cruises names Silver Moon

SILVERSEA Cruises has held the highly anticipated christening ceremony for its new *Silver Moon* in the Greek port of Piraeus, with the event seen as a key milestone in the line's return to service.

Moon officially became Silversea's vessel, in a ceremony watched on by VIP guests including Royal Caribbean Group Chairman & Chief Executive Officer Richard Fain, Chief Financial Officer Jason Liberty, Godmother Gaia Gava, Silversea President & Chief Executive Officer Roberto Martinoli, and Fincantieri Merchant Ships Divison General Manager Luigi Matazzaro (**pictured**).

The ship has been sailing her inaugural season from Athens since late last month, operating a series of 10-day itineraries through the Greek Isles. Last night's celebration saw a traditional blessing by Reverend



Father Ioannis Patsis, followed by the ship's godmother, Gaia Gaja from Italy's renowned Gaja Winery, smashing a bottle of champagne on *Moon*'s bow. Guests viewed the action on

screens throughout *Moon*.

It was the first Silversea christening since the cruise line became part of Royal Caribbean Group, with Fain saying it was a "very proud moment indeed".

"I commend Silversea's leadership team, Captain Georgiev and *Silver Moon*'s crew, the team of Fincantieri, and everyone involved in the ship's launch for their tireless efforts in bringing this long-awaited milestone to fruition," Fain said.

Martinoli said as the first ultraluxury cruise vessel to set sail in 2021, "Silver Moon leads the way in the return of ultra-luxury cruising...she represents our industry's strength and resilience".

Kimberley shift

THE Kimberley Ports Authority (KPA) has this month taken over responsibility for the ports of Derby, Yampi Sound and Wyndham.

The transfer is the second phase of the WA Government's ports governance reform program, with the additions formerly under WA Department of Transport control.

KPA CEO Craig Faulkner said the change would facilitate planning, development & trade. "Our shared value of experiential travel resonates with the Virtuoso family, making Aurora an ideal fit for the network," Upchurch enthused.

Virtuoso travel advisors can now access the Aurora profile via the portal, detailing voyages, pricing sheets, images, trip notes and other relevant collateral.

Yarra ferry concern

WHERE to now?

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IF YOU'RE hoping to celebrate your next Antarctic expedition with a tipple, it'd better be aboard the ship!

Home brewing has been banned at Australian Antarctic stations, with alcohol limits being tightened.

Australian Antarctic expeditioners have passed down knowledge about how to make a good homebrewed beer for years, but it is a tradition that it is about to end, with a new alcohol policy being implemented by the Australian Antarctic Division, which outlaws home-brew and recommends no more than 10 standard drinks per week.

MRPS restarting

MURRAY River

Paddlesteamers (MRPS) is back cruising as scheduled, with the Victorian State Government's announcement of changes to restrictions last Tue.

Cruises can proceed, following outdoor fixedseating, outdoor non-seated and accom guidelines.

Capacity limits will apply for sightseeing cruises, and face masks must be worn aboard when not seated for drinks and meals.

All onshore tours will depart from the Victorian side of the Murray River at Toorumbarry Weir, and shorex on four-night cruises have been replaced.

Polaris floats out



VIKING has marked the float out of its second expedition ship, *Viking Polaris* (**pictured**) set to debut next year.

The 378-guest ship met the water for the first time on Tue, ahead of her launch next year in the Arctic and Antarctica.

Polaris will now move into its final stage of construction in the outfitting dock.

After final fitout, *Polaris* will be delivered at Fincantieri's VARD shipyard in Soviknes.

"We are now one step closer to our launch of the thinking person's expedition, with new voyages that will allow our guests to explore the ends of the world and closer to home—in comfort," said Viking Chair Torstein Hagen.

"We are grateful for our long-standing partnership with Fincantieri, who has helped us build the world's most beautiful ocean ships and are now helping us perfect expedition cruising.

"We look forward to welcoming guests on board Viking Polaris and Viking Octantis next year." MEANWHILE, the cruise line has welcomed guests back on board in Malta, for the Welcome Back roundtrip from Valletta.

Guests embarked aboard Viking Sea and sister ship Viking Venus in Valletta for the cruise line's return to the Mediterranean.

Exclusively available for vaccinated guests, both ships are sailing three new itineraries roundtrip from Valletta, including the 11-day Malta & the Adriatic Jewels, the 11-day Malta & Greek Isles Discovery and the 21-day Malta, the Adriatic & Greece.

Viking has partnered with Lufthansa to offer non-stop flights from Newark Liberty International Airport to Malta, exclusively for its guests.

"We are delighted to be back in the Mediterranean and to be homeporting in Valletta," Hagen added.

"On behalf of the entire Viking family, we thank the Government of Malta for its support and partnership in developing these fantastic new voyages," he said.

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AIDAluna restarts

AIDA Cruises' AIDAluna will restart in Sep from Germany. The ship will be the seventh in the fleet to restart operations this year, with a variety of travel dates for three- and four-day cruises now available for booking up

to 14 Oct. *AIDAluna* will call at Gdynia on the four-day cruise and Gothenburg on the three-day.
