# Ponant confirms Aus restart details

**PONANT** has announced further details about its Australia restart next month, in time for this year's Kimberley (pictured) season.

The cruise line has confirmed departures between 28 Apr and Oct (CW 21 Mar), following the highly anticipated announcement by Western Australia it will welcome small ships with a maximum of 350 persons to its waters (CW 04 Apr).

A highlight is two new dates for the popular 10-night 'Australia's Iconic Kimberley' cruise, between Broome and Darwin onboard Le Soleal.

High points on the itinerary include visiting Western Australia's Hunter River, discovering the King George River on a Zodiac excursion; reaching the Twin Falls, the highest in WA; and a visit to Collier Bay, to explore Montgomery Reef.



General Manager Sales & Marketing Asia Pacific Deb Corbett said the announcement was incredibly exciting, following a two-year hiatus due to COVID.

"We've been anticipating this announcement for many months and have been working behind the scenes to ensure we are ready to set sail for the magnificent Kimberley as soon as possible," she said.

"Australia's Kimberley is one of the greatest wonders of our country, with such grandeur and majestic beauty; it's certainly an absolute bucket list destination for both Australians and international tourists and we look forward to sharing it again to those whose travel plans have been put on hold".

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## Aurora acclaims Antarctica achievements

Aurora's 22-23 Antarctica season will commence in Oct, and forward bookings are performing strongly, with many voyages close to sold out.

The cruise line also recently released its 2023 Arctic season, with new itineraries including the 'Jewels of Coastal UK', 'Across the Arctic Circle', and 'Canary Islands, Cape Verde and the Azores', all of which have so far seen an "overwhelmingly positive response", the cruise line said.

## Hurtigruten x UTas tie-up



**HURTIGRUTEN** Expeditions has signed a nine-year partnership with the Institute for Marine & Antarctic Studies (IMAS) at the University of Tasmania for Antarctica research.

Running through to Jul 2031, the new partnership will guarantee IMAS access and support for an on-site study into scientific and social programs, and will see researchers on board Antarctica and South America Hurtigruten Expedition ships.

This will create opportunities for travellers to participate in ground-breaking experiments, Hurtigruten said.

The cruise line's Chief Scientist Verena Meraldi confirmed there are already three projects being planned for the coming Antarctic

"We're scheduled to have Marine Mammal Observers on board our 2022-2023 Antarctic season as a follow-up of the project we supported during the 2019-2020 season." Meraldi affirmed.

"We'll welcome two researchers on three departures on MS Fridtjof Nansen, who will be studying the impact of Citizen Science participation on our guests' travel experience and attitude towards Antarctica."

Meraldi said Hurtigruten is also identifying which departures will be ideal for a pilot study on the behaviour and habitat of ice seals in the Antarctic Peninsula.

**Hurtigruten Managing Director** & Vice President Sales & Marketing Asia-Pacific Damian Perry added: "we're very excited to announce our long-term collaboration with the University of Tasmania to support social and natural science research projects on board our ships."

"Our science projects with IMAS will not only provide contributing data to the scientific community, but they will also enhance our guests' experiences through face-to-face interaction with the scientists and their work".
