Anne next in line to Cunard throne

CUNARD Line has announced *Queen Anne* will be the name of its new ship joining the fleet in early 2024.

Anne will join Queen Mary 2, Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth to mark the first time since 1999 that Cunard will have four ships at sea.

The new vessel will feature reimagined Cunard signature spaces, new guest experiences within dining, culture and entertainment, and an updated livery.

Leaders at state and federal level seem to acknowledge this. New South Wales Premier

Dominic Perrottet and federal Minister for Tourism Dan Tehan have both voiced their support for cruising in recent days.

Yet, we still have no firm plan for cruising's revival in Australia, no sign of a date, and our state and federal governments are still pointing at each other when asked why.

After Mon's announcement by the Prime Minister, we're now in the ridiculous position where international visitors will soon be arriving without quarantine, Australians are free to travel overseas to cruise, yet we still cannot sail in our own waters.
