No more homeports

CRUISE ships will no longer be able to start or end their sailing in Charleston, South Carolina from 2024, according to a local news report.

Vessels will also no longer be able to overnight in South Carolina's largest city, but will be able to dock for a daily call.

The South Carolina Ports Authority said it has decided to not renew a home port deal with Carnival Cruise Line, with the result to see the number of passengers in Charleston cut by 80%.


The Ports Authority said it will also no longer work on plans to redevelop a warehouse at the Union Pier into a cruise terminal.

Permits to start the project have been tied up for years by lawsuits from conservation and historical preservation groups.

Carnival said it will continue to work with the Authority to find options to use Charleston.

Currently, about 70 cruises per year leave Charleston for the Bahamas and other Caribbean destinations.

Explora I floats out



EXPLORA Journeys has celebrated a key construction milestone in its history, with the float-out of Explora I (pictured).

A ceremony was held at the Fincantieri shipyard in Italy for the first of four ships from the luxury ocean cruise line.

Explora I is set to be delivered in just 12 months at the end of May 2023, while her sister ship, Explora II, will launch in the northern summer of 2024.

At the event, Explora also indicated that it will take a look at the introduction of engines powered by liquefied natural gas on Explora III and Explora IV.

MSC Group Executive Chair Cruise Division Pierfrancesco Vago said: "at Explora Journeys, we are building ships for tomorrow, utilising today's latest technologies and while being ready to adapt to alternative energy solutions as they become available".

"At the same time, the brand's commitment to sustainable ocean travel extends beyond just the environmental and maritime technologies but is also embedded in our onboard guest experience.

"Destination experiences will be designed to leave a positive impression and footprint on the places and people visited by placing a spotlight on local talents, craftsmanship, culture, [and] gastronomy, traditions."

Explora Chief Executive Officer Michael Ungerer added: "the float out of Explora I is a hugely significant milestone in the realisation of our vision to redefine the ocean travel experience with a new luxury travel brand that we have designed to connect travellers with the ocean and themselves.

"Today's event is great opportunity for our valued travel partners to see how the ship is taking shape and build even more excitement for Explora I's launch in just 12 months."

A ship fit for a Princess



HOLLAND America Line has held the naming ceremony for its new ship Rotterdam with godmother Princess Margriet of the Netherlands.

Esteemed guests joined her to officially welcome the new flagship to Holland America, including the ship's Captain Werner Timmers and Group President Jan Swartz, who are pictured with the Princess.

The eighth in line to the Dutch throne was welcomed at the ship's gangway with a traditional floral bouquet presented by seven-year-old Nora van Dijk, daughter of Nathalie van Dijk, a member of the Holland America team for 15 years.

Following the ceremony, a gala luncheon was held on board, followed by a gala dinner and the opportunity for guests to pour champagne over Rotterdam's bell - a Holland America tradition when welcoming a new ship to the fleet.

"Our heritage is rooted here in the Netherlands, and we are deeply honoured to have Her Royal Highness Princess Margriet as godmother of her fifth Holland America Line ship," said the cruise line's President Gus Antorcha.

"After a challenging couple of years, we are excited to celebrate this memorable moment in our company's history."

Antorcha said when Rotterdam was delivered last year, Holland America postponed her naming ceremony so it could be held in the city the ship is named after.

Holland America has a history of "royal namings", with the cruise line's connection to the Monarchy of the Netherlands going back nearly a century to Prince Hendrik, who launched Statendam III in 1929.

Since then, members of the House of Orange-Nassau have launched 11 more Holland America vessels throughout the years.

Princess Margriet herself has named Prinsendam (1972), Nieuw Amsterdam II (1983), Rotterdam VI (1997) and Oosterdam (2003).



Time to celebrate

AUSTRALIA'S cruise industry has officially moved into recovery mode as we celebrate the first passenger sailing from Sydney Harbour after two years of suspension.

As P&O's Pacific Explorer departed yesterday evening on a four-night round-trip to Brisbane, it became the first international vessel to carry passengers from Australia's east coast since the start of the pandemic.

It follows the return of Ponant's expedition ship Le Lapérouse which began operations between Darwin and Broome in Apr, joining other local operators in time for the important Kimberley

Now that operations are resuming on both sides of the country, Australia's cruise community can begin rebuilding what was previously a \$5 billiona-year contributor to the local economy.

With extensive new health protocols in place and a strong track record shown already in other countries, we have every reason to be optimistic.

Globally, 88% of CLIA's oceangoing cruise ship capacity has already resumed service and we expect that figure to exceed 95% by the end of Jul.

Passenger volumes are expected to return to 2019 levels by the end of 2023.





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
