A Vela good day

VIKING has marked the float-out of its newest ocean ship, Viking Vela, which is set to debut next Dec.

The 998-guest ship recently met water for the first time, ahead of her inaugural season sailing voyages in the Mediterranean and in Northern Europe.

Following a two-day process which will set Vela afloat at her shipyard, she will then be moved to a nearby outfitting dock at for final construction and interior buildout.

"It is always a proud day when our newest ship meets water for the first time," Chair Torstein Hagen said.

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ACA urges Vic Ports to work with cruise

THE Australian Cruise Association (ACA) is urging an immediate whole-of-government approach to developing a forward-looking cruise strategy, which will respond to the needs of the fast-growing sector, and resolve the current tensions in Victoria (CW 29 Nov).

ACA Chief Executive Jill Abel called on all sides of government in Victoria to work closely with cruise lines and industry assocations to develop a strategic outlook which supports the growth currently being enjoyed by the sector in Australia.

The calls come as Carnival Corporation, which itself cried out for greater collaboration with the Victorian State Government, announced the cessation of the deployment of two of its cruise lines from Melbourne from 2025 (CW yesterday).

"The State Government simply

cannot afford to turn its back on the cruise sector, but nor can this be turned into a political hot potato," Abel insisted.

"This is no time for fingerpointing or looking in the rear-view mirror - it is a time for strategic planning to develop a cohesive future cruise strategy in a way that will work for all.

"It is time to look at berthing requirements - if Station Pier is to be the dedicated cruise facility for Melbourne, there needs to be appropriate investment, beyond a maintenance and repair program, on delivering a contemporary, fitfor-purpose facility."

Abel said the strategy also needs to look at how government works with cruise lines currently visiting Victoria, particularly as the state provides a critical link for southern itineraries visiting WA, SA, and Tasmania.

"Victoria has a critical role to

play as we continue to develop this country's cruise sector and we look forward to the government recognising this and acting accordingly to bring a crucial resolution to these current challenges," she added.

The ACA was joined by Virgin Voyages in its calls, with the cruise line dissuading the Victorian Govt from introducing "unnecessary" barriers to the growth of the cruise industry.

"Virgin Voyages is committed to bringing global attention, visitors and economic benefits to Australia, and in particular, Victoria," a spokesperson for the cruise line told CW.

"We encourage the Victorian Govt to consider the unnecessary obstacles and barriers that the increase in fees and charges at our home port will have on our business and others" - more on page 2. MS

THE Seine is more than suitable for cruising, but Paris is aiming to make its river suitable for Olympic swimming.

The water quality is actually acceptable for bathing on many days throughout the summer, but Paris is looking to improve it even further before the Games in Jul.

The primary goal is to make the Seine completely bathable by 2025, with Paris currently building a storage basin capable of holding 46,000m³ of wastewater to reduce the risks of pollution.

The water will be tested every day during the Olympics to make sure it is safe for swimmers.

Australia a "difficult" cruise market

AUSTRALIA is becoming a more difficult market to cruise from, Carnival Corporation Chief Strategy Officer Teresa Lloyd has revealed, stoking fears regarding the lackadaisical decisions recently made by state governments around the country.

Lloyd, addressing the media earlier this week in the wake of the cessation of Carnival Corp's Melbourne voyages of two of its cruise lines (see **page 1**), said the company is considering "all deployment everywhere" as margins become thinner around the industry.

"Australia and this region is becoming more difficult since the restart," she conceded.

"Fuel is very expensive in this part of the world, the distances we have to travel to go to different ports is a long way, we have issues that compound operating in this region." Carnival has asked for a meeting to fully brief ministers on the significance of the rate hikes, Lloyd said, and to explain what they mean, and what the impact is, indicating the company is not turning its back on Victoria.

"We're confident we'll have a meeting with the minister soon, and we really look forward to having that discussion," she said.

"It's too late for 25/26, but for the future, we want to bring the ships back."

Melbourne's loss is the gain of other cruise destinations around Australia, Lloyd confirmed, with the company set to redeploy some of the lost voyages to Sydney and Brisbane, where it is less expensive to call.

Cruise lines were first informed of the magnitude of the rate increase, which will apply from next year, a number of months ago, but only received formal confirmation last week.

"A much more moderate increase would have been something that could have been accommodated, but this increase and the prospect of further significant increases is really what's triggered this decision," Lloyd said.

She ominously added although Carnival Corp hopes it will reach a decision with the Victorian stakeholders soon, other cruise lines within the company are considering their own decisions for the coming seasons.

The revelation is the latest wake-up call to just how precarious deployment prospects are in Australia - a roller coaster the industry rode back in May, when the Government of NSW ruled out the construction of a cruise ship terminal in Yarra Bay, without presenting an alternative option (**CW** 29 May). *MS*
