Aurora Starlink

AURORA Expeditions has finalised the installation of StarLink satellite internet connectivity aboard its Greg Mortimer and Sylvia Earle.

Available free of charge in all cabins and public spaces aboard both vessels, the high-speed service allows passengers to connect with family and friends, and catch up with the news or work even in the most remote environments.

CEO Michael Heath said reliable connectivity had long been a challenge for expedition operators, particularly in polar regions.

"We're thrilled to continue to offer cutting-edge technological innovations to meet the needs of our expeditioners, and we have already received incredibly positive feedback," he said.

Barcelona cuts capacity

AUTHORITIES in Barcelona, Spain have imposed new restrictions on cruising, including a ban on docking at the "Muella Barcelona Norte" and the World Trade Centre area in a bid to lessen pollution.

Effective from 22 Oct, all vessels at the popular destination will be forced to utilise the southern port along the Moll Adossat pier, currently used by larger vessels.

Rather than being able to simply stroll off cruise ships into the city's historic Las Ramblas centre, transfers will now require a 30-minute bus ride.

"We are pushing the pollution away, towards the south, and reducing the emissions that reach the city," said Port of Barcelona chief Luis Salvado.

As well as the removal of passenger cruising from the central docks, Barcelona is also reducing the number of available



cruise ship docks from 10 to seven late this month.

The changes are the outcome of a 2018 agreement between cruise lines and the Barcelona local government "to eliminate the negative impact that this activity could produce for citizens".

Salvado said the changes aim to "stabilise" the number of people using the port, with the first half of 2023 already seeing an 8% uplift in Barcelona cruise visitors compared to pre-pandemic levels.

The Wellness Club aboard Queen Anne will also offer a program tailor-made for solo travellers, providing an opportunity for like-minded guests to relax and unwind together at a meet-and-greet.

One of the key wellness spaces aboard is The Pavilion (**pictured**), which is located on the top deck with a specially designed glass dome roof that can be retracted when in warmer climates.

The multi-purpose space



incorporates the Wellness Cafe, an alternative dining experience catering for breakfast, lunch and daytime diners "celebrating the vibrancy of plant-powered foods and sustainably sourced meat, dairy and fish options".

Queen Anne's wellness offerings will include a host of experiences including a Himalayan salt sauna, a cold room and even cryotherapy treatments.

The ship is currently undergoing its final fit-out prior to planned sea trials in the coming months. *BP*

The collaboration will see doctors aboard *Paul Gauguin* provide volunteer consultations during scheduled port calls, while the cruise line will also transport health professionals commissioned by the Government to undertake advanced specialist consultations.

The 'Taote Gauguin' (Doctor Gauguin) initiative will "allow us to further support the people who have so warmly welcomed Paul Gauguin Cruises into their lives for 25 years, proudly sharing their cultures, traditions and natural wonders with our guests," said Ponant/Paul Gauguin US CEO Navin Sawhney. *BP*

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


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
