NZ cleaning up

THE New Zealand Cruise Association (NZCA) wants the country's government to build a safe cleaning facility for ships, following two years of cancelled sailings due to biofouling (**CW** 14 Mar).

Last season 11 ships, mostly cruising from Australia, were barred from entering New Zealand, and informed their hull needed extra cleaning, leading to the cancellation of almost 40 port calls.

Only one ship has had to cancel her planned itinerary this season, however NZCA Chief Exec Jacqui Lloyd told local radio station NewstalkZB a more permanent solution for vessel cleaning is required.

Norway to require net zero ships

CRUISE Lines International Association (CLIA) said it hopes to work closely with Norway's national and local authorities, in the wake of reports the country is looking to phase in a zero emission mandate for ships visiting its fjords.

CLIA told *Cruise Weekly* it hopes to ensure good access to new fuel solutions so its members' ships can continue to sail in the Norwegian fjords.

A proposal from the country's National Maritime Authority will require cruise ships using low- and zero-carbon fuels to transition to zero emissions from 2026 to 2035.

CLIA's current timeline for its members is to carry out their net zero emissions goal by 2050.

"Cruise lines have committed to a vision of net zero emissions by 2050 and are investing in new technologies to achieve



this ambition," CLIA told *Cruise Weekly* in a statement.

"The cruise sector is exploring a range of fuel solutions including green ammonia, battery technology, and advanced biogas and biofuel.

"The cruise fleet is being continuously upgraded to use shoreside electricity, and several ports along the Norwegian coast have shoreside electricity projects

underway," CLIA added.

Most cruise lines which visit the Norwegian fjords have ordered LNG-fuelled ships, however many of these newbuilds will not be delivered by 2026.

It is unclear what Norway's slated transition landscape to net zero from 2026 will look like, nor whether any cruise lines which visit the region will be able to meet the targets. *MS*



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Cruises cancelled to avoid Red Sea

MSC Cruises has cancelled three Grand Voyages in Apr to avoid transit through the Red Sea, as the Houthi involvement in the Israel-Hamas war continues to impact ships in the region.

The three voyages are all repositioning cruises, and were scheduled to sail from South Africa and the UAE.

The ongoing attacks on merchant vessels in the Red Sea have seen the cancellation of a 24-night cruise of MSC Splendida from Durban to Genoa, a 21-night sailing of MSC Opera from Dubai to Genoa, and a 23-night voyage of MSC Virtuosa (pictured) from Dubai to Southampton.

The three ships will instead transfer around West Africa to Europe without any passengers on board, and avoid transiting through the Red Sea.

All passengers booked on the three repositioning cruises have



been, or are in the process of being, contacted directly or through their travel advisors.

They can transfer their booking to a future Grand Voyage of a similar duration for free.

Affected passengers can also rebook to any other cruise in MSC's global network, with either a partial refund or additional payment for the difference in price of the original booking, or receive a full refund with no

cancellation fee.

"The safety of passengers and crew is the number one priority and as there was no viable alternative itinerary, the company has regrettably had to cancel the voyages," MSC said.

The series of Houthi attacks has also seen Silversea Cruises cancel two Silver Moon vovages between Muscat and Dubai.

The cruises were scheduled to sail from 16 Jan to 26 Jan. and from 26 Jan to 11 Feb, with affected guests and their travel advisors informed of their reprotection options.

Silversea told Cruise Weekly the safety of its guests, its crew members, and the communities it visits is always its top priority.

"Our global security team continues to closely monitor the situation in the region and will make any additional changes if required." MS

Meanwhile, Travelmarvel's 'Essential Vietnam & Cambodia' cruise is a 12-day sailing available from \$4,140 per person twin share.

Cruisers can save up to \$5,000 per couple until the end of next month, unless sold out prior.

Travelmarvel said the deal applies to travel between Feb 2024 and Mar 2025.
