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Princess catches more Alaska tours

PRINCESS Cruises has expanded its Alaska national parks cruisetours program in 2025 and 2026, following the successful launch of its 'National Parks Expedition' last year.

The line is now offering new variations, which visit anywhere from three to five national parks, combined with its 'Voyage of the Glaciers' seven-day cruise.

The voyage is paired with scenic rail travel and multiple wilderness lodge stays.

Among the new offerings are the 'National Parks Explorer', which will visit four parks in 14 days, in addition to the cruise.

This extension features two nights at Kenai Princess Wilderness Lodge, two nights at Denali Princess Wilderness Lodge, two nights in Fairbanks, and one night at Mt. McKinley Princess Wilderness Lodge.

National parks visited include



Denali, Kenai Fjords, Glacier Bay, Klondike Gold Rush National Historical Park, and Skagway.

There is also a new 'Katmai National Park' itinerary, visiting two parks in nine days.

This extension features two nights in Anchorage, in addition to the cruise, visiting Katami National Park and Glacier Bay.

Next year, this extension will be replaced by the 'National Parks

Adventurer', which visits three parks in 14 days.

This includes two nights in Fairbanks, two nights at Denali Princess Wilderness Lodge, two nights at Kenai Princess Wilderness Lodge, and one night at Mt. McKinley Princess Wilderness Lodge.

National parks visited on this extension include Denali. Kenai Fjords, and Glacier Bay. MS

Crystal early payout

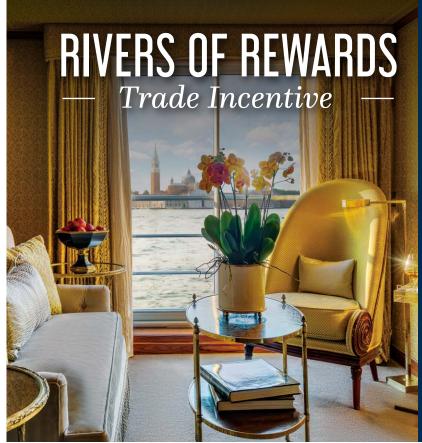
CRYSTAL Cruises will now make commission payments as many as 90 days before departure, instead of the standard 30 days.

The new offer is available to Australian travel advisors, Crystal confirmed.

The new payment schedule is dictated by the length or type of booking made, with longer sailings paying sooner.

The changes are effective immediately, including retroactively to all existing, qualifying standard bookings that have been paid in full.

The cruise line recently revealed the complete first half of its 2027 itineraries aboard Crystal Serenity and Crystal Symphony, which span six continents and more than 170 destinations (CW 06 Feb), including French Polynesia, the Amazon River, and the Med.

Coral's 10 years in Tas



CORAL Expeditions will kick off its 10th season exploring Tasmania in thrilling fashion by shadowing the Sydney to Hobart yacht race on Boxing Day.

Departing Sydney on 26 Dec, a new seven-night itinerary will trace the east coast and spend New Year's Eve sailing along the Derwent to Constellation Docks.

The season will feature several new itineraries and an amended schedule exploring the state on the 72-pax Coral Discoverer.

Itineraries ranging from four to 14 nights will offer opportunities to go ashore on Maria Island, Bruny Island and the Freycinet headland, along with activities including kayaking and hikes.

Two complete circumnavigations of Tasmania are on sale now, departing on 13 Jan and 26 Feb, with the 14-night itinerary including visits to Wineglass Bay and Strezlecki Park on Flinders Island in the Bass Strait.

Guests will also enjoy an overnight stay in Port Davey and the Bathurst Harbour World Heritage area, along with a visit to Launceston, Port Arthur and the Maria Island settlement.

"Tasmania is a unique and pristine island at the edge of the world and a landscape that lends itself to expedition cruising," said **Coral Expeditions Chief Operating** Officer Jeff Gillies.

"We have pioneered expedition cruising in Tasmania 10 years ago and proudly showcase this magnificent destination to a small and lucky cohort of explorers spread across our eight departures," he added. ML

Through concerted advocacy efforts, we are working to protect the economic value of cruising in New Zealand and show what's needed to achieve stronger levels of cruise tourism in the future.





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
